## *Pastor Mauri's Musings*

Later this month we will embark on this year's observance of the season of Lent. This is the perfect time for us as believers to make a concerted effort to practice the spiritual disciplines. One of these disciplines is solitude. "Solitude" is the creation of an open, empty space in our lives by purposefully abstaining from interaction with other human beings, so that, freed from competing loyalties, we can be found by God.

One does not need to dig deeply in the Gospels to see that Jesus' very public ministry was interspersed with periods of solitude during which He, either completely by Himself or with the disciples, left the crowds behind to pray. These times of solitude appeared to nourish Jesus for those times when He was in the public eye. He began His ministry with forty days in the wilderness, just after He was baptized. And He continued the practice of going off alone to pray, often just at the times when His ministry seemed to demand the most from Him.

Solitude is not about becoming a hermit. In fact, times of solitude can enhance our times of fellowship with others, Neither is solitude loneliness. It is time spent with God. When we put it this way, it sounds like a no-brainer, yet for most of us this time does not just happen. One of the keys to the definition I mentioned earlier is the phrase "the creation of an open, empty space." We must work to create this space, to "purposefully" withdraw even when—especially when—it seems like we have no time to do it. We can all learn from Jesus' example and take time to focus on our relationship with God, replenishing and nourishing ourselves for busy lives. This has made a difference in my life, as I have a special place in our home where I spend quiet time with the Lord each morning. And I've discovered that if I miss this time because of other conflicts, it leaves an empty spot in me. Believe me, this will make a difference in your life. As you look to begin this holy time of year, why not make this a memorable experience by getting started with this important disciple.

## UGANDA MISSION TEAM NEWS

Greetings St. Peter's,

The Uganda Mission Team wishes to thank each and every one of you for the support and especially the prayers for this past trip. It was truly one of the best so far. We repaired 3 wells and provided medical treatments to six villages. Two of these villages we were never at before. We see a decline in the cases of jiggers and ringworm. By repairing the wells and continued medical treatment, we have seen the progress that we have achieved.

We met with Pastor Andrew and have explored the possibility of helping to fund a school there. Land has been acquired and the planning has begun. As with anything, a well formed plan needs to be put in place before building can begin.

One part of the trip really touched our hearts. We visited a small orphanage with 12 children residing in it. Six of those children did not have beds. We went to a local shop and had three bunk beds made and delivered them the next day. You should have seen their faces!! The children were so happy. We also gave money to provide for a month of food. We are currently assisting Joseph (our driver) to relocate this orphanage to a place of their own. The building they are in is located on land they do not own and they are ready to be evicted. The team is working on a way to sponsor the orphanage and we will have more information available soon. This could be a turning point for our mission as the church is doing pretty well on its own.

We have only been home a week and a half now, so we are still trying to get back to our normal lives. There is so much to tell and we will be putting a program together soon. Please attend our next dinner Feb 10 and meet with any team member for more details.



Many of you would be familiar with our Willing Workers outreach, but you may not know that it has been since 2018 that we asked interested members if they would like to be on this list, so we would like to bring this outreach back into the forefront once again. Here is what it is all about:

If you have a particular skill or just a heart of compassion to help people in need, St. Peter's has a need for you to sign up to be one of our church's Willing Workers (many of you are already very willing workers demonstrating lots of different skills, but the list that Pastor Mauri, Sheri, and Pam would like to have on file in the church office is for a more specific purpose.) From time to time there have been requests for the church to help out when a family or an individual has had some kind of situation going on that they can't handle completely by themselves, and some of you have already been contacted to provide some assistance (and the people who have been helped by you have been extremely grateful.) We continue to realize, however, that it is very beneficial to have a more complete list of people who are willing to be called on if a particular need arises at any given time. We would like to have the list include these various tasks: transporting people, helping with shopping, providing meals or cleaning services, doing yard work or handyman jobs, and babysitting or providing companionship. Please know that, in general, these tasks would be considered more short-term in nature and that if you are contacted to do something and you have to say 'no' for some reason, that would be acceptable.

#### JONI AND FRIENDS - 'WHEELS FOR THE WORLD'

If you were fortunate enough to be in Sunday school (and also at the beginning of our worship service that day) back in October when Rob Olszewski from Gospel Fellowship PCA spoke about his work with 'Joni and Friends' (he is part of the chapter in Ohio), you were probably very touched with all that Joni Eareckson Tada's ministry to the disabled around the world has accomplished since it was first started. Rob has had a significant responsibility to this ministry and he touched on many things during his presentations. One of the things that stayed with me was when he mentioned that he and others would be transporting wheelchairs to Columbia in March and that they would be looking to acquire wheelchairs (used ones in good condition are what they are looking for) to take with them. When he talked about seeing a disabled child or adult be put in a wheelchair for the first time and suddenly become mobile and the impact that has on that person, I know it affected many of us deeply. He also talked about a challenge that he would be having with another chapter leader regarding which chapter would be able to collect the most wheelchairs. So... that's where St. Peter's comes into the picture. We are going to help Rob and his 'Joni and Friends' friends by seeing how many used wheelchairs our church family might be able to collect and then donate to Rob's chapter. I believe that even if we only get a few, it would certainly make a difference in the lives of people who have never known true mobility. If any of you have a used wheelchair or know of someone who might be willing to donate one (and remember, each wheelchair needs to be in pretty good condition), the wheelchairs can be brought to the church anytime in January or February (up to the 24th of February), and we will be transporting any wheelchairs we receive to Gospel Fellowship PCA Church the next week so that they can be delivered in March when the teams travel to Columbia. This is truly an exciting outreach to take part in, and I'm sure that Rob will let us know the final number of wheelchairs collected (and if his chapter won the challenge.) If you have any questions about this or need more information, please contact me or Sheri at the church office (724- 452-8120.) So that's the opportunity that is before us! Let's get 'Ready...Set...Go' to be part of a life-changing experience for people thousands of mile away, but no matter where they are, they are certainly close to the heart of God!

## A GREAT OPPORTUNITY AT PASSAVANT HEALTH CENTER (LUTHERAN SENIOR LIFE)

I have something exciting to share with all of you who are in the 65+ years old group that I hope you will take advantage of. For years, I have been involved in various activities at Passavant Health Center, and I have been very blessed by volunteering there as well as taking classes at the Fitness Center, attending various events, and eating at both The Bistro and Baron's Inn, among other things. I have known that many things at Passavant are open and available to the general public, but this has seemed to be a well-kept secret to people who live in Zelig and the surrounding area. So this article will attempt to uncover the 'secret' and will serve as an invitation to a free luncheon and presentation given by Brian Damaska, the head of the relatively new 'Aspire' program at Passavant. 'Aspire' was developed and incorporated last year and it is very comprehensive in its effort to provide a total wellness program for residents of Passavant as well as those in the larger community who are 'seniors'. The name 'Aspire' is actually an acronym that describes all the facets of the program, which include: A-Active, S-Spiritual, P-Purposeful, I-Intellectual, R-Relational, and E-Expressive. The purpose of the get-together that will be hosted by Brian is to enjoy a time of fellowship over a meal and then listen to an overview of what 'Aspire' offers. You will probably also be able to take a look at the Fitness Center with its new state-of-the-art equipment, along with the pool, you can check out the rest of 'Main Street', including the Gift Shop, and you can see where the Gently Used Shop and other specific activity rooms are. This event will take place on **Wednesday, February 22<sup>nd</sup>, from 11:30-1:30** and as I mentioned before, there is no cost for you to attend. I will, however, need you to RSVP to me at the church office (724-452-8120) or my home (724-452-8345) by **February 13<sup>th</sup>**. I wanted to advertise this to our church family in enough time for you to put this date on the calendar and then to RSVP. There is no expectation that you will need to join 'Aspire' (there is a yearly cost for this program, but as I understand it, if you only want to use the Fitness Center, for instance, as long as you have a Silver Sneakers card, you are eligible to take advantage of almost anything that they offer.) So plan to come and find out more about this well-kept 'secret' that is right in our proverbial 'back yard'. I don't think anyone who attends will be disappointed (and there is much that I didn't explain to you, but I know that Brian will do that in his presentation.) I hope to hear from many of you in these next weeks!

**Interesting history** on a well known hymn, "We Three Kings of Orient Are" and it's proven connection to Harmony, Zelenople, and St. Paul Church with John Hopkins Sr. provided by one of our own members, Tom Nesbitt.

John Henry Hopkins Jr. (1820 –1891) was an American clergyman and hymnodist, most famous for composing the song "**We Three Kings of Orient Are**" in 1857. He wrote words and music to his most famous hymn, "We Three Kings", as part of a Christmas pageant for his nieces and nephews.

Hopkins Jr. served as rector of Trinity Church in Plattsburgh, New York from 1872 to 1876 and of Christ Episcopal Church in Williamsport, PA from 1876 to 1887. He delivered the eulogy at the funeral of President Ulysses S Grant in 1885, and died in Hudson, NY. He was buried next to his father at Bishop's House, Rock Point, Burlington, Vermont.


His father John Henry Hopkins Sr. (1792 – 1868) emigrated from Dublin to Philadelphia, PA with his parents in 1801. The passage across the Atlantic Ocean was very long, stormy, and everyone on board feared total shipwreck. Young John "knelt down and prayed to God to deliver them out of their danger." A sailor saw him praying and told the captain, "the ship was safe" because "such a little angel was on board."

Hopkins Sr., at the age of twenty-one, moved west to manage the ironworks at **Bassenheim**, Butler County, near **Zelenople, PA**, at a salary of \$1,000 a year. There he superintended the building and management of a smelting furnace. Later he completed his studies in Pittsburgh, where he was admitted to the bar in April 1819, and he continued to practice law until he gave it up in order to be ordained.

On May 8, 1816, in **Harmony, PA**, a Lutheran pastor, **Johann C.G. Schweitzerbarth**, united Hopkins and Melusina Mueller (1795-1884) in marriage, with family and a few friends in attendance. Hopkins is attributed to the gothic design of **St. Paul Lutheran Church** in neighboring Zelenople, PA.

During his tenure at Trinity Church, Hopkins established eight Episcopal churches in the Pittsburgh area, including Christ Church in Meadville, PA. When Hopkins Sr. established the church in Meadville he rode on horseback ninety miles from Pittsburgh through slush and snow.

Hopkins Sr. arrived in Boston as assistant in Boston's Trinity parish, he was elected bishop by the first diocesan convention of Vermont on May 30, 1832. Three weeks after his consecration, Hopkins and his family moved to Burlington, Vermont. He lived there until his death on January 9, 1868.

## LIBRARY HIGHLIGHTS FOR FEBRUARY - READ ALL ABOUT IT!!!!

*Since the weather is still a little iffy, why don't you cozy up in a warm blanket and read a good book or two from our church library. Below are a few donated fiction books and one new non-fiction recently added.*



**The Parting** by Beverly Lewis: 'Nearly one hundred days have passed since the untimely death of Nellie Mae Fisher's beloved younger sister, Suzy, and Nellie dares again to dream of a future with handsome Caleb Yoder. But with rumors about Suzy still flying among the People, there are those who would keep the young courting couple apart... including Caleb's own father. Meanwhile, a growing number of Honeybrook's Amish farmers are demanding tractors and other forbidden modern conveniences. When a revival adds to the tensions, passions flare. With the Old Order community pushed to the breaking point, Nellie and Caleb find their families—and themselves—in the midst of what threatens to become an impossible divide.'

**The Guardian** by Beverly Lewis: 'Come home to Hickory Hollow, Pennsylvania—the beloved setting where Beverly Lewis's celebrated Amish novels began—with new characters and new stories of drama, romance, and the ties that draw people together. When Jodi Winfield comes to Lancaster to house-sit, the last thing she expects to find is a disheveled little girl alone on the side of the road. The young teacher is mystified when she learns there have been no reports of a missing child, and the girl herself is no help, since she can't speak English. It's as if the child appeared out of nowhere. Then Jodi turn her attention to Hickory Hollow—and the cloistered world of the Old Order Amish—in search of answers.'

**The Love Letters** by Beverly Lewis: 'Marlena Wenger's life takes an unexpected turn on the day she learns she must care for her estranged sister's baby. Spending the summer in Brownstown, Pennsylvania, to assist her Mennonite grandmother, and miles from Marlena's Old Order Amish beau, she feels out of her element in nearly every respect. Yet Marlena determines to do her best and stay focused on her future, even as those hopes become drastically altered.'

**Letter to the American Church** by Eric Metaxas: 'Can it really be God's will that His children be silent at a time like this? Decrying the cowardice that masquerades as godly meekness, Eric Metaxas summons the Church to battle. The author of a bestselling biography of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Metaxas reveals the haunting similarities between today's American Church and the German Church of the 1930s. Echoing the German martyr's prophetic call, he exhorts his fellow Christians to repent of their silence in the face of evil. An attenuated and unbiblical 'faith' based on what Bonhoeffer called 'cheap grace' has sapped the spiritual vitality of millions of Americans. Paying lip service to an insipid "evangelism," they shrink from combating the evils of our time. Metaxas refutes the pernicious lie that fighting evil politicizes Christianity. As Bonhoeffer and other heroes of the faith insisted, the Church has an irreplaceable role in the culture of a nation. It is our duty to fight to the powers of darkness, especially on behalf of the weak and vulnerable. Silence is not an option. God calls us to defend the unborn, to confront the lies of cultural Marxism, and to battle the globalist tyranny that crushes human freedom. Confident that this is His fight, the Church must overcome fear and enter the fray, armed with the spiritual weapons of prayer, self-sacrifice, and love.'
